# What's Happening @ Riverwood

**HOA Monthly Fee:** This month, the Riverwood Board voted to raise the HOA fee by \$40 to **\$480 per month**. A letter notifying Residents of the change has been sent to all Homeowners at Riverwood, as per our CC&Rs and Bylaws (30 days notice). The increased dues will begin on May 1, 2023. Please update your automatic payments to reflect this change.

**Maintenance Update:** Riverwood received a document from our garbage collector, Heiberg Garbage & Recycling. It is an agreement stating that they will pick up our garbage, **excluding all hazardous waste**. Jim was told that the State requires this agreement. It was signed by our Board President. The net result of this communication is that we must all pay attention to what NOT to put in our garbage! No Hazardous Waste! Here is a discussion of hazardous waste from Metro:

**IDENTIFYING HAZARDOUS WASTE**: Being able to recognize which products around the home are hazardous is an important part of ensuring proper disposal. Some products may include words such as: "warning," "caution, "flammable, "poison," or "danger." The following descriptions characterize household hazardous products:

- Ignitable capable of burning:or causing fire.
- Corrosive capable of eating away materials and destroying living tissue.
- Explosive or reactive able to cause an explosion or release poisonous fumes when exposed to air, water or other chemicals.
- Toxic poisonous, either immediately or over a long period.

**DISPOSING OF TOXICS SAFELY**: Ivletro accepts various types of household hazardous waste for recycling or disposal. Bring it to one of IVletro's two transfer stations year-round -just \$5 for up to 35 gallons of household hazardous waste or participate in a free Metro collection event from March to November.

### Stop Social Security-Related Scams! Recognize the four basic signs of a scam:

- 1. Scammers **pretend** to be from a familiar organization or agency, like the Social Security Administration. They may email attachments with official-looking logos, seals, signatures, or pictures of employee credentials.
- 2. Scammers mention a **problem** or a prize. They may say your Social Security number was involved in a crime or ask for personal information to process a benefit increase.
- 3. Scammers pressure you to act immediately. They may threaten you with arrest or legal action.
- 4. Scammers tell you to **pay** using a gift card, prepaid debit card, cryptocurrency, wire or money transfer, or by mailing cash. They may also tell you to transfer your money to a "safe" account.

Ignore scammers and report criminal behavior. Report Social Security-related scams to the SSA Office of the Inspector General (OIG). Visit <a href="https://www.ssa.gov/scam">www.ssa.gov/scam</a> for more information.

From Nancy Stoll: As you may know, I do not drive. On Wednesday, Feb. 22, the day of our snow event, I was visiting my mother at Providence Hospital. When I looked out the window and saw the snow was sticking, I headed downstairs and attempted to order a Lyft at approximately 3pm. Unfortunately, I hadn't updated my phone number on their website, so that wasn't an option. I next called Radio Cab and finally reached a dispatcher to request a ride, but it was impossible to predict when it would arrive. Meanwhile, Radio Cab #70 pulled up at the entrance. The driver got out and I asked him if he was looking for me. He said no, he was there to use the restroom. When he returned, we discussed my predicament: I'd ordered a cab, but didn't know when one would arrive; he asked where I was going and I told him; he said he'd take me home. I was very thankful.

We headed east on Halsey, but saw vehicles stuck/sliding on the overpass above I-205. So, we re-routed, back-tracked and were heading north on NE 82nd. We were across the street from McDaniel (formerly Madison) High School when we became stuck behind numerous TriMet buses, sedans and even a PBOT truck. People were out of their cars, trying to help each other by pushing, digging out and shouting encouragement. The PBOT guy used his shovel, finally got chains on the truck, changed lanes, and proceeded to plow one of the northbound lanes. We never saw him again.

At some point Micah, my cab driver, turned off the meter. Meanwhile, Lisa Dashiell had started a text chain for D-70 at 4:10. I replied with my predicament at 7:20. At 7:23 Lisa told me that Larry would come get me. Larry traversed side streets and was in a line of cars about 1.5 blocks from where we were stuck. Micah and I walked to Larry's (actually Lisa's) trusty Nissan Rogue. At that point, Micah was planning to walk home (approx. 2 miles). Larry didn't hesitate and said he would take him home, too. So, we traversed side streets and got to E Burnside and dropped Micah off at his home, then proceeded on our way. There wasn't much traffic on Burnside and we got on 102nd with no problems until we got to the overpass above I-84 where cars were stopped, stuck, sliding, and driving south in the northbound lane. We maneuvered through that mess and got on Fremont, and then home. I walked in the door at 11:15pm. I made it home thanks to Micah and my wonderful neighbors, Larry and Lisa!
