<u>From Karen E:</u> Lately crows have been seen picking open plastic garbage bags set out for Thursday pickup. A couple ideas for deterring them are (1) spraying outside of the bag with a little Windex; or (2) spraying with a peppermint oil mixture. The recipe is about 2 cups water, 10-20 drops peppermint oil, and a little liquid dishwashing soap; shake well. Peppermint oil can be found in the

health and wellness section of many supermarkets. (Peppermint flavoring in the baking aisle isn't the same thing.)

[Editor's note: Residents may also purchase a small, 20 gallon plastic garbage can and lid at most hardware stores. These are just about the right size for 1 bag of trash and the lid will keep wildlife out.]

<u>From Karen L</u>: Pet Owners Alert — Recently there have been several **coyote sightings** around 8-8:30 a.m. in Driveway 30. This is a reminder that they can be around at any time of the day or night, and we need to be sure our pets are safe. Very small children also can be in danger. The critters are able to jump 6-foot fences, but there's never been a report of that occurring in Riverwood.



From Healthy Little Peach on Facebook: Nature's Homemade Cherry Limeade Gatorade! Serves 2



- 1½ cups coconut water (or sub filtered water or decaf green tea)
- 1 cup aloe vera juice (or sub with green tea, coconut water, or filtered water)
- 1 lime, peeled
- 1/2 cup pitted cherries
- $\frac{1}{4} \frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt
- 1-2 tbsp honey or maple syrup (more or less to taste)



1.Add everything to a blender: coconut water, aloe juice, pitted cherries, lime, salt, and sweetener.

2.Blend until smooth.

3.Pour over ice through a fine mesh strainer to remove pulp (or just drink the pulp, too!) 4.Garnish with fresh cherry and lime slices.

From Lisa D: Birch Community Services, birchcommunityservices.org. The Sustainable Families Program. Over sixty percent of Americans are living paycheck to paycheck. These families are working, but still struggling to make ends meet. Whether through jobs that don't provide livable wages or living under a cloud of debt, these financial burdens keep hard-working families from being able to get ahead and put them at risk for short-term food insecurity and long-term stagnation.

Now knowing someone who is actively participating in the Birch Community Services, I can vouch for the great service provided through this organization. There is no income restriction. Your food dollars will be stretched, freeing up finances for other needs in your household, along with providing free financial counselling. There is a waitlist which can be months long so it is important to contact the program to get on the waitlist.

<u>From Lisa D</u>: Interested in solar but constrained by the cost? **Bright Saver**, <u>brightsaver.org</u>, is an organization that works with lower-income households to provide access to discounted or free plug-in solar panels to help lower energy costs. They review your application to "determine eligibility and fit, including whether you're home during the day and likely to use the energy the panels produce. If you qualify and your home is a good match, [they] will reach out to you directly with next steps."



From Jann G: I want to take a minute to highlight the East Portland Tool Library. This is the organization that helped us out with a wheelbarrow and tools when Riverwood came together to mulch the East Bed (next to the Rec Room) this summer! They have a lot to offer and it's free. They are also always looking for tools to add to their collection. Just visit the Wishlist on their website and the next time you are purging a garage or moving, keep them in mind!

Scam Alert from Bank of America: Know the red flags that signal a scam

Scammers are constantly reinventing new ways to trick people. While their stories may change, their tactics remain the same. Being aware of these red flags should make you pause, verify, and help stay protected:

- You're contacted out of the blue.
- You're pressured to act immediately.
- You're asked to pay in an unusual way
- You're asked to provide personal or account information
- It seems too good to be true

Remember: If you authorize a transfer or send money to a scammer, there's often little the bank can do to help get your money back. Read our tip sheet on talking to friends and family about fraud, scams and cyber security.

Argay Terrace Neighborhood Association News:

Fred Meyer in Gateway sclosing in September. The store has been open for over 70 years in the Hazelwood neighborhood and was famous for the arch (photo below) on the front of the store in the Gateway Center, which stood for over three decades before being deconstructed. This Fred Meyer closure is one of 60 others nationwide. The company has not publicly stated why the Northeast Portland store was selected for closure. The store's fuel station will remain open.

It's made in Argay? Ruby Jewel! Who knew! You may have seen their ice cream sandwiches at your local store. Those dessert treats are produced in the business park just North of Sandy Blvd.

Hyper local produce: Those veggies you see grown right here in the farm fields of Argay Terrace can be purchased at Growers Outlet on NE 161st and Glisan. No planes, trains, tariffs for these veggies - just a couple of blocks from field to market. For the tomatoes you will need to eat at Kann or check out Farmer Evan PDX at Sellwood Moreland farmer's market. Spada's vegetable stand and u-pick on NE 158th is still open carrying fresh vegetables.

River fun: The majestic Columbia river is right on our doorstep - sometimes it is easy to forget that. A 15 minute scenic drive from Argay

Terrace are a couple of dining spots on the Columbia River. Enjoy a summer sunset before they are gone. The Sextant Bar and Galley offers informal dining and drinks. For a splurge try Salty's. And for on-the-water breezes, check out The Deck, a seasonal restaurant literally floating on the river.
